I'm sorry to hear that you've had such an invalidating and traumatic experience and that the **coercion and control you experienced within your relationship** is continuing to cause a profound impact.

Unfortunately within the scope of my role I am not able to provide ongoing support or DV counselling to people, but from what you've described it sounds like something that would be beneficial. I would be more than happy to refer you to the St Vincent's Hospital Domestic and Family Violence Service who can provide you with ongoing counselling and advocacy (it's free) and is located just up in Darlinghurst. I highly regard the clinicians and service this team provides. Is this something you would be interested in?

Subject: Rebekah from Day st suggested I contact you

Hi,

Rebekah suggested I contact you about what's happened/happening with Issac Rushton. Issac uses Legal Abuse to control and punish. He makes false complaints to the police; often the complaints are what he has actually done to me but he changed our roles. I'm limited to truthful statements but Issac crafts his accusations to appeal to the person he's talking to. It seems that by describing situations where he seems like a bad character it is accepted as truth — he just makes me the much worse person in his complaint. All I can say if anything is that it's manufactured and gaslighting. Even when I can show/prove it's untrue I've already been dismissed.

For a long time he would tell me he has gone to the police about something but I never heard any more so didn't believe it. But he was, and at some point the dozens of accusations reached a tipping

point where an avalanche of police contact started and by then my file must be saturated with stories of awfulness. By then I had no credibility in what I said and Issac was the victim of me. A person in need of police protection.

He stalks. He has a personality disorder of some kind and has no empathy.

I don't know what to say here. It's disjointed when I try to explain. So much happening and all intertwined and I've tried to not think about things so the memories do not retain. He works very hard at what he does; there is always something new he's working on while his last project to harm me is still just unfolding.

I have had a particularly bad experience with Detective Chatfield from Kings Cross. I don't believe he's of good character. I think he's the type that joins the police for the power that it gives over citizens. He's the arresting officer and has gone out of his way to harm me. And he's done this, I believe, knowing that I'm innocent. The day of arrest there was a 'moment' when we both realised who each other was — when he held the proof in his hand that Issac had lied on every point of his statement. He asked why I hadn't shown the police this before; it was all on my phone in files. And he took the phone and kept it from me. Even when the OIC said I can have the phone back, Chatfield wouldn't. He had the proof of what was happening.

I'm not sure if you can help, but I sort of trust Rebekah. She's always been nice in my interactions.
